### Joe's Corner: the Long Goodbye California: great racing... and an "escape plan"

**Hor\$ense** is **35**, and I'm reminded of how it changed my thinking on handicapping. It seems just like yesterday ...

After four LONG years in Arizona, it was - once again - time for a change of scenery. We accomplished a lot: we saved up for a solid retirement and stayed warm year-round (golf!)... but at the cost of awful live racing. As it turned out, So Cal was dragging me back. I had "escaped" twice - in 1978 and again in 1993 and I figured we wouldn't stay long... but was I ever wrong!!!

After a tough time initially finding suitable work, I had some mad money and started back to live top-tier racing and wagering. I also wrote many PRN articles. Handicapping was both Jekyll (solid, from 2003-14) and Hyde (ugly, from 2015-17)... which was because I got a bit distracted working on Hor\$ense!

The first few years I spend a lot of my spare time making BIG improvements. In 2005, the Professional version was released, earning an 81/2 rating from PRN. The next 10 years were spent working on a major upgrade. In 2015, I completed my work and released the **Expert** version, which got a "solid 9" rating from PRN. This led to multiple years of a track-sponsored guest handicapper gig at Del Mar. And, I finally broke through in Las Vegas multi-day tournaments, cashing in 2015 and 2016.

By 2017, I was tired of the daily grind and decided to retire. There was only one thing left to do... MOVE!!!

And that led me to the desert sands of Nevada...

# Featured – More Track Shenanigans Updates...

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## What will the future of betting look like??? I'm willing to weigh in !!!

I've been ranting about this for years decades, so bear with me one MORE time...

In my early days as a guest writer for thoroughbred racing publications, I shared a "unique" view on the future of racing. I proposed "major leagues", comprised of the big-name tracks of the time, which would run on Fri-Mon or Thu-Sun weekends, and the rest as "minor leagues", to be run on Tue-Thu or Mon-Wed weekdays. **So, how's that going?** Well, we currently don't have any formal leagues, but the various big circuits have filled in some gaps. We do have more weekday/night circuits, and the weekend circuits have done a better job of NOT running their marquee races at the same time. But more can be done to tame the latest crisis in the industry, and isn't hard to implement... if the tracks <u>REALLY</u> worked together!!!!!

*What's the impetus for your outrage, Joe?!?* Well, as a handicapper of 55+ years – starting at age 12 with help from my dad – I've seen a whole lot of changes. While I once believed that the main reason for thoroughbred racing's downward spiral was track closures, technology has changed that landscape. Traditional handicappers need help to revive the sport, and the help might need to come from an unlikely place... sports betting. And, it would also be nice if the tracks worked together to make it work*!!!* 

Let's get track closures out of the way first. Yes, with the higher level of tracks being closed, there WILL be a need to properly consolidate operations. But, losing major tracks – due mainly to mismanagement and growing property values – doesn't have to be the end of the line. Race tracks have been eaten up by "sprawling suburbia" for as long as there has been something called "the suburbs". **Examples? Gladly!** 

While a Gulfstream closure would impact south Florida, there are other statewide options. The idea of the Palm Meadows training track being reconfigured for fans has been floated. And the land where Hialeah once operated is a longshot possibility. Plus, Tampa Bay Downs could add some dates. The new "open year-round" Belmont will end racing at Aqueduct. And once Pimlico reopens, the doors will close for good at Laurel. **Ah, California... what to do with you?** Santa Anita – another 1/ST Racing race track and land holding – AND Los Alamitos will be turned into something else, for the same reasons as Hollywood Park. That would leave Del Mar... wow! And... Washington state's Emerald Downs might close in 2026 if they can't pay their increased HISA fees. **So, what can be done to go beyond "just existing"? Well...** 


You're gonna need to stay with me on these... not all are brilliant, but many could work. Let's start with a simple one; getting tracks with similar schedules (ideally in the same time zone) to use 10-minute race gaps. *Huh?* Okay, take a group of three tracks (let's say NY, MD and KY) and stagger their post times 10 minutes apart, with bets tied to each track (ex., race #4 at each track). We still get to have our regular racing... and it gives amateurs a quick (under 30 minute) multi-race play. I have another idea, which is a bit tricky, and it ONLY involves changing the ENTIRE racing culture of daytime racing. We need more evening racing! Let's be blunt: baseball gave up day games to get more people to go, so why not racing? Trotters do it, and Los Alamitos has run evening quarter horses forever, so why can't thoroughbred racing make some adjustments? Just imagine a world where people who work days could get home and play multiple tracks, starting at 6:00 and ending by 10:00. And on weekends, night racing is just another party!

# So, that's my latest high-level plan. Any chance it happens? I'm not entirely sure, but something needs to change... and it needs to happen pronto!!!

(Yes, I get worked up about this... but, in my defense, I've been this way for 30+ years!)

The **System Settings** were revamped in the 2024 **Expert** release, but the sheer size can be intimidating. Lucky for you, I'm here to help!!! **But how?** 

Let's attack it head-on! For those with the latest release: ask how much of it you're using, and what should you use? For those without it: consider what you would use. Let's take a look...



First, what's not covered. [1] the **Conditions** sub-sections (it's based on your own style), [2] the **Customizations** sub-sections (except for Handicapping Mode, all display related), and [3] the **Input-Output** options (Input is required, Outputs are merely useful). This leaves us with the **Calculations** and the **Hor\$martsPlus for Facets** section! I'll flag the new features with the "<u>NEW</u>" label; older features will have no designation. **Now, let's dig a little deeper.** 

**Screening:** *for race prep.* The **Pass/Play Decision Control** lets you make races easier or harder to play. I set this feature to -5, and this "easier" setting usually gets me at least one (1) extra play from a card.

**Evaluation:** for each horse. [1] The <u>NEW</u> **Temp Speed Tool Switch** lets you switch – from the SR/TV to the BRIS Speed Rating – if a PP has no SR/TV. The most accurate settings are **YES**, **ANY surface** and **YES**, **Wet/Dry must match** box checked. This "switch" check occurs for every race. [2] For **TROUBLE Calls**, you must be in the Interactive Handicapping Mode to use it, and it works best when you check the <u>NEW</u> **Cap Max Lengths** box. [3] The <u>NEW</u> **SPEED** "**smoothing**"... option modifies PP times – for each call and the finish – to match race distance/class limits, which is very useful for distance/surface switches.

**Evaluation – Hor\$martsPlus for Facets** is both old and new. The BIG change is the <u>NEW</u> **Confidence** feature, which lets you apply <u>your</u> handicapping knowledge of each facet to the evaluation of every race.

Analysis: for the field. [1a] SPEED Reduce "Lengths Ahead" will "reign-in" an overly-aggressive final time for the projected winner, closing the gap to the rest of the field. [1b] The SPEED and PACE/TRIP adjust using race post positions "recovers" the lengths lost on turns for each horse in the field, based on each horse's running style (determined by the datafile vendor). [2] The <u>NEW</u> Use More FINISH, Less PACE/TRIP option alters the default – which uses less FINISH and more PACE/TRIP.

#### Now, go ahead experiment with these... see if it makes a difference !!!

It was busy for a mid-week card, and it had a good vibe! Opened as Tampa Downs in 1926, reopened post-WW2 as Sunshine Park, the current name has been in place since 1980. The racing was fair, I netted a **big fat** \$2.20 on the day's plays. It should remain untouched until such time that it... goes away.

Yep, I'm jumping right into the "drama". I got to Gulfstream "early" the next day and walked around, and I'm happy to say that I'll come back if it doesn't close. The day was nicer and the card was better, but I still surrendered \$2 of my Tampa profits. Oh well, there's always another racing day ahead. **Thanks for the fun & the 20¢, Florida**!!!

#### Trevor Denman retires... and says goodbye as only he could...

For four decades, he had one of the most recognizable race-calling voices in America. To me, he was more than a race caller, he was an innovator and a storyteller. He was not afraid to call the winner at the wire, even if he wasn't 100% sure... and he was almost always right!

What made him revolutionary at the time, was that his keen eye was evident the entire race, and he shared exactly what he was seeing... not just each horse's position and lengths behind. Add to that, he had so many signature phrases, most of them forever stuck in the heads of folks like me. And the fans throughout So Cal – Santa Anita, Del Mar, Hollywood Park, Golden Gate and Fairplex – were spoiled by all of this. Also heard and seen nationally, he was always a professional.

On a personal note, we once briefly chatted at Del Mar, and he's as a nice a person as you'd expect to meet. And there is this: his was the last voice I heard – "gentlemen, please remove your hats…" – before the American flag went up the pole, followed by my proposal to my wife on Big 'Cap Day in 1987. Not an easily forgotten memory.
